Painting white flowers on white paper without using white paint - what a crazy thought! Actually in nature a white flower is suffused with reflection and shadow and picks up the subtle shades from whatever it is around. In this watercolor workshop learn how to mix



and use grays, create pastel mixes and position foliage to bring out the three-dimensional image of the flower, making it appear even whiter than the paper!!!!

Supply List

• Paper: Canson Tracing Paper: 11x14

Watercolor Paper - 11x14 - 140 or 300 lb. hot press paper of your choice

Transfer paper

• Pencils: Graphite Mechanical Pencils, HB-2H range

- Erasers: Kneaded eraser and Tuffstuff eraser stick
- Brushes: Bring brushes of your choice. I use a Raphael Kolinsky 8408 size 1, 2 and 4. For lifting and blending I use Robert Simmons Round Sienna brushes size 2, 4, and 6.
- Palette: Round 5-10 well plastic or porcelain I use a round china plate!
- WC Paints: Bring whatever artists quality paints you prefer. I generally use Winsor & Newton and Daniel Smith:

Hansa Yellow Light - DS Aureolin - DS New Gamboge -DS Yellow Ochre - DS Quinacridone Gold - DS Alizarin Crimson - DS Permanent Rose - WN Quinacridone Red - WN Pyrrol Orange - DS Ultramarine Blue - WN Cerulean Blue - DS Cobalt Blue - WN Indanthrone Blue - DS Mineral Violet - Holbein Perylene Violet - WN Burnt Sienna - WN

- Masking Fluid Winsor & Newton and Standard Pen holder with Hunt 513EF Nib
- Container for water, paper towels
- Magnifier 3" diameter hand held
- Light Battery Powered
